


Figure 1. Egyptian art and architecture




Figure 2. Greek Architecture




Figure 3. The 3 Orders of Ancient Greek Architecture




Figure 4. Islamic ornament




Figure 14. Organization in architecture




Figure 15. Scale and Proportion




Figure 16. Interaction of Light and Shadows




Figure 18. Visual Connectivity in Architecture
